- (1) the Fall, Rapid or Pouch Indians, improperly called Minstaires of the Prairie, +
- (2) the Black Feet

have principal seats on the South fork of Sask. Their hunting grounds extend as far south as the sources of the Yellowstone R + of its various tributary streams.

The Rapid Indians are the more easterly tribe and are more generally found bet the Sask + the Missouri, in the vicinity of and above the Mandan villages. They have

estimated at 3000' souls.

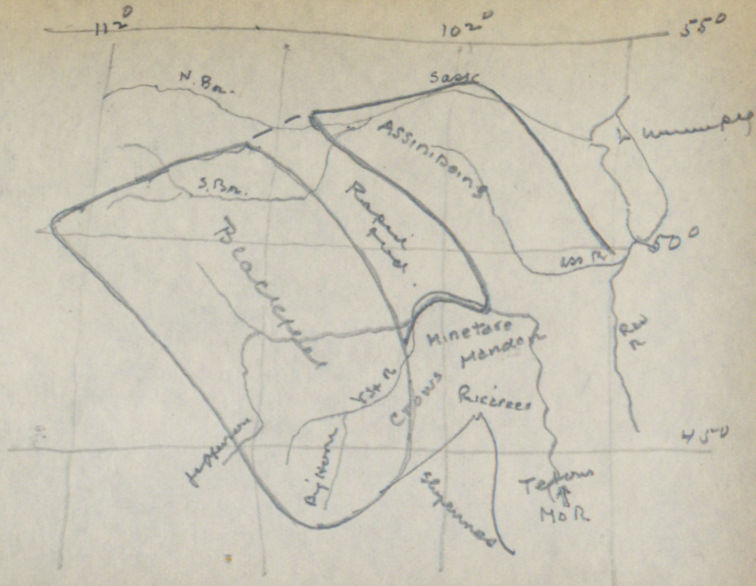
