SUBJECT: Filling Quotas to Authorized Strength.

1: Your attention is directed to the telegram of October 30th, transmitted to you by mail under which Entrance Requirements for admission to units of S.A.T.C. after the date of the said telegram were somewhat altered.

2: It may be that before these alterations were made, applicants were refused admission to your unit because of insufficient credits who would now, under the altered entrance requirements, be eligible for induction. If your quota is not complete, or if the number in your unit falls below your quota by reason of the transfer of men away from your unit, it is suggested that you draw upon the list of rejected applicants to keep your quota up to full strength.

3: The work of giving publicity to vacancies in S.A.T.C. units throughout this District has been delegated to the District Headquarters and has been specifically taken away from the individual institution. This office would be pleased to receive from you the suggestions as to the means of giving publicity to your particular unit.

4. Will you be kind enough to forward to this office the names of the High Schools and Preparatory Schools which contribute annually to your institution substantial numbers of students. It is our purpose to communicate your needs to these schools.

SUBJECT: Attendance of students to classes.

1. Replying to your letter of this date regarding the attendance of students at class, I desire to say that after our conference on that subject at these Headquarters some days ago, it was believed that you had, in accordance with the understanding then agreed to, kept a record in your office of the absentees, as reported from each class, said list of absentees to be submitted to these Headquarters from day to day, for notation on the list, opposite each man's name, as to whether he was excused or not.

2. To facilitate the plan agreed upon between us, it was further agreed that a S.A.T.C. man would be assigned to you as clerk, to keep the record and to do the paper work involved in the system above outlined. Recently I have made inquiry as to whether the clerk had been asked for or not, and got the impression that ~~you had not~~ asked for a clerk, leaving the inference in my mind that one was not deemed necessary.

3. Referring to the command in your letter that "Commanding Officers are responsible for the ~~academic exercises~~ ^{academic exercises} forming parts of the program to which they are assigned," you are advised that in accordance with that requirement organizations are assembled at "School Call" and ~~marched to the vicinity of their respective~~ ^{to the vicinity of their respective} class rooms. A report of authorized absences should be made to these Headquarters, but in the absence of such reports it would be assumed that the men were all present. This being done, the Commanding Officer would feel that he had ~~met his~~ ^{met his} responsibility in the matter, by at least assembling the men for academic duties, and requiring them to be marched thereto.

4. The plan suggested by you, that the Commanding Officer divide each class into groups or squads of 10, 20, or such number as may be deemed best, and place each group in charge of a sergeant or other responsible member of the corps, who will

keep a record of the attendance at class of the students in his group or squad, and that a weekly report of all absentees, with explanations of same, be given to the instructor in charge of the class, would, in my opinion, involve too great a task, with the limited help at my command, clerical and otherwise, to be successfully accomplished.

5. I believe that I had already explained this point to you when the matter was under advisement between us, and I am still of the opinion that the plan suggested by me, and heretofore agreed to by you, would be the best one to pursue. You will recall, doubtless, that when we talked this matter over, you yourself suggested that each academic official in charge of a class should make report of absentees to you as Director of Studies, in order that you might submit one single consolidated report of absentees to the Commanding Officer.



3. Referring to the comment in your letter that "Commanding Officers are responsible for the academic exercises forming parts of the program to which they are assigned", you are advised that in accordance with that requirement organizations are assembled at "School Call", and marched to the vicinity of their respective class rooms. A report of authorized absences should be made to these Headquarters, but in the absence of such reports it would be assumed that the men were all present. This being done, The Commanding Officer would feel that he had met his responsibility in the matter, by at least assembling the men for academic duties, and requiring them to be marched thereto.

4. The plan suggested by you, that the Commanding Officer divide each class into groups or squads of 10, 20, or such number as may be deemed best, and place each group in charge of a sergeant or other responsible member of the corps, who will keep a record of the attendance at class of the students in his group or squad, and that a weekly report of all absentees, with explanations of same, be given to the instructor in charge of the

class, would, in my opinion, involve too great a task, with the limited help at my command, clerical and otherwise, to be successfully accomplished.

5. I believe that I had already explained this point to you when the matter was under advisement between us, and I am still of the opinion that the plan suggested by me, and heretofore agreed to by you, would be the best one to pursue. You will recall, doubtless, that when we talked this matter over, you yourself suggested that each academic official in charge of a class should make report of absentees to you as Director of Studies, in order that you might submit one single consolidated report of absences to the Commanding Officer.

SUBJECT: Attendance of Students at Class.

1. In my letter of November 2nd,, I asked to be informed whether provision had been made to keep record of attendance in accordance with instruction sent out by the Committee on Education and Special Training of the War Department on October 8th stating that "The Commanding Officers will be responsible for the prompt attendance of soldiers on the specified exercises and will report absences to the academic instructors."

2. Under date of November 5th, the Committee on Education and Special Training issued more detailed instructions on this subject and stated (Par. 7): " Commanding Officers are responsible for the regular and punctual attendance of their men at all regular academic exercises forming parts of the program to which they are assigned."

3. While these instructions make it clear that the question of attendance is placed in charge of the Commanding Officers, the following suggestions have been offered on the part of the academic authorities and are now restated:

A. That the Commanding Officer divide each class into groups or squads of 10, 36, or such other number as he may deem best, and place each such group in charge of a sergeant or other responsible member of the Corps who will keep a record of the attendance at class of the students in his group or squad.

B. That a weekly report of all absences, with explanation of the same, be given to the Instructor in charge of the class.

My Dear Bishop Shahan:-

I have just had a long and pleasant talk with Dr. Fowler, the D.C. Health Officer. At first he was very positive that no exception could be made in favor of any educational institution in the District of Columbia, to allow indoor classwork to be resumed. He stated positively that if any Institution had been conducting indoor classwork, it was without his knowledge, and contrary to the general understanding that all would comply with the health ordinance prohibiting it.

After he had made that plain to me, ~~he~~ suggested that possibly Georgetown University had acted upon the assumption that if the students were quarantined, and no outside day students permitted to enter the University classrooms, there would be no objection to the indoor educational work. Thereupon Dr. Fulton advised me as follows:

If students of the Catholic University are kept constantly within the limits of the University Grounds, it will be proper to resume indoor classwork, with the distinct understanding that students living outside the University Grounds, or as he expressed it, not quartered in the University Barracks or dormitories, shall be excluded from the classwork at this time.

In accordance with the foregoing, I have telephoned it in substance to Dr. Dougherty, and requested him to communicate it to Dr. Pace. I also made the suggestion that it might be better not to begin with the classwork tomorrow morning, on account of the completion of the typhoid inoculation, which if not completed this P.M., must be completed tomorrow morning. In other words, if you so desire, the academic classes may be resumed at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon. Of course it will be necessary to have the decision made known to me or to my Adjutant, Lieut. Levy, some time this afternoon or evening, in order that proper military orders may be given in the matter.




