SHENANDOAH

"Shenandoah" for the past four years has been and continues to be, an "experience" for the students, faculty, and staff of Catholic University. You might want to sing in front of the large fireplace in the rustic living room, or you might want to walk through the tree-shaded Appalachian trail. Then again you might want to sit on the large stone porch and look out over three states. Inside the large mountain lodge a group might be discussing numerous aspects of life at C.U.A. with a faculty member, a campus minister, or an administrator.


The Shenandoah experience is first and foremost an event in community. Sponsored by the Campus Ministry department, Shenandoah participants seem to grow in their faith and to grow in a sense of brotherhood at C.U.A. The discussions on prayer, Jesus Christ, and the changing face of Catholicism aid the undergraduate in clarifying his faith. Discussions with Dr. Nuesse, Dr. Walton, and numerous deans aid the sense of communication sought here at C.U.A. Staff members from Student Personnel Services aid the student in his continuing search for his own personal identity.

While the discussions are going on, a group is in the kitchen preparing for the next meal, a group is leaving for the Trappist Monastery in the valley for 5:15 vespers service, and a group is preparing for the liturgy to be held in front of the fireplace on Saturday night.

In short, a lot happens at Shenandoah. It is a place to sing, walk, talk, pray, and, most of all, a place to reflect on where you're going and why you're going there. Each Shenandoah experience is different, each is unique.

Twenty or so students and several university staff live this experience for a weekend at an 82-acre estate situated 70 miles directly west of D.C. atop the Blue Ridge Mountains in the Shenandoah Valley. Supported by student government and campus ministry, the Shenandoah "experience" is a distinct event in college life for it aims by means of discussion and prayer to build up that sense of community which is so necessary for the real educational experience.



Emerson's Ltd.



7820 Eastern Ave., N.W., 726-7300; 1511 K St., N.W., 659-8170; 401 "M" St. (Plum), 498-8377. Open til 10 p.m. on weeknights, 10:30 p.m. on weekends. Average dinner runs \$4.00. No reservations required.

Where can the CU student find a decent steak, French-style bread, a salad bar, and all the beer you can drink? For under \$4? If you haven't guessed by now, keep reading; if you have, have another pitcher. For a nice spot to eat before the show — or before hitting the Rat — Emerson's, any one, is the place.

A swelling enterprise on the Eastern Seaboard, Emerson's is at that point where the price is right and the quality is still there. Waiting lines are common, but actual waiting isn't. The decor is extremely pleasant, late American takeoff on early English pub, with the right combination of low lighting, friendly service, and overly congenial companionship — which it usually is after the fifth pitcher.

At the bar — alcoholic — mixed drinks are served with special emphasis on a concoction called the Grog (my lips are sealed to its secret ingredients), which, with its price tag courting \$3, is like ordering a second meal, and one that might not quite agree with the rest of your intake. Especially if it consists mostly of suds. The salad bar sports a variety of dressings and toppings — enough to satisfy the most sophisticated lettuce lover in your crowd. The greens themselves are pick and choose, but with proper timing — say the arrival of a new salad bowl — one can have a heart of the lettuce every time.

Emerson's abounds with specialty nights. Monday is "All the Steak You Can Eat"; Tuesday, "All the Prime Ribs"; while "Buck - Off" nights are featured Sunday through Thursday. Usually on these nights the place is packed, and it's therefore best to arrive before 6 p.m. — and the rest of the CU crowd. An 'Emerson's' time is a metaphor for a fast, quick pace, which is often the case on the way out (or down) to E. Ltd. Driving home is a whole 'nuther story.

Silver Slug



Cross Roads (McMahon Basement), Catholic University of America Campus. Open daily from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Reservations not required, but it helps if you have George Washington with you.

This restaurant has many distinctions, among them being a post office in the main dining room and a computer center located to the right of the entrance.

The atmosphere is pleasant, a bit on the rough-and-ready side, but it offers the diner an opportunity to view a slice of American life. The decor is ultra modern, consisting of large posters of vending machines pasted on the wall and early Fine Arts Council movie posters, mass schedules, and bookstore closeouts. Dress is informal and comes in a variety of styles, varying from braless halter tops, to full-length gowns. Service is prompt, and the food is always served piping hot from one


of the two microwave ovens.

Another of the distinctions for which the Silver Slug is known internationally is its menu — it never changes. The same fare is offered from the moment the doors open to when the last lock is secured. No alcoholic beverages are sold, but customers are allowed to "brown bag" it if they desire. It does, however, serve a large variety of coffees, milks, and carbonated drinks.


Entrees range from dog dela bun 35¢, chile a la soggy bun 45¢, and leg of ground beef, with cheese topping 75¢. There are other entrees, but the times I visited the Silver Slug they were not available.

The only problem I foresee for the restaurant is the proximity of dining tables. The Silver Slug has space for 107, but seating for only three. Thus, much of the clientele that frequent the Slug find dining uncomfortable at best.

A final note on the Slug is that while the establishment frowns on tipping, some of the waiters are still not above taking your money. **Cavete Machinās.**



The Rathskellar



located in the basement of the Social Center, X5207. Open daily from 7:30 a.m. to 1 a.m. First come first served.

The Rathskellar, better known as the "Rat," is by far the most popular establishment on the Catholic University campus. The decor is molded after elementary schools found in the Washington area; all the tables and benches are heavy oak and the customers are invited to leave their names thereon.

The establishment represents the demands of students at Catholic for quick, good American cuisine at a fair price, and the Rat has been moderately successful at this.

The menu highlights french fries, pizza, subs, and cheeseburgers, all prepared with a minimum of grease. Alcoholic beverages are sold, with draught

beer being the house favorite, but a mild distinctive rose wine is also served. Either way the price is right: 30¢ for beer, 25¢ for a glass of wine.

The unique concept about the menu at the Rat is that the morning menu is identical to the dinner-time menu. Thus, in the space of three days one can exhaust the entire menu without having to worry about missing a breakfast or dinner entree.


The reason that many people fail to notice this is that they usually order liquid dishes from the bar for their dinner. Of course, many folk, full on their happy hour intake, blissfully float through the dinner hour. But then again, neither the Rat nor its customers ever were in doubt as to their priority of consumption.

Entertainment is provided three nights a week, beginning usually at 9:00 p.m. On those nights a cover charge of 25¢ is requested.

*A complete dinner for two ran, with drinks, to about \$3.25 each (\$1.25 for food, \$2.00 for beer).



Four Flaggs



323 Flather Hall, 635-6012. Open daily. Breakfast begins when somebody gets up to make it. Lunch is self-service buffet. Dinner is served every nite, almost, at 6 p.m. Group membership (\$10 per week) mandatory. Reservations required.

The Four Flaggs, a minuscule place that opened just last year, is pleasant enough. (the decor is done in early administration yellow). The distinctive point about this restaurant is the tremendous variety that comprises the menu, for the Four Flaggs is truly an international truck stop.

The menu varies — Swedish meat loaf, Polish chicken and rice, Spanish spaghetti, and Dutch fried chicken. Alcoholic beverages are sold there, but the quantity and quality varies, with Friday nite being the best for obtaining your favorite drink.


Another unique feature about Four Flaggs is the prices. Tickets for meals can be purchased in blocks of twenty-one for only \$10.00. It is advised, however, that the diner not dally to the end of the week since the menu has a curious way of decreasing in variety to a single entree — meatless rib roast with dehydrated carrots.

Until just a short time ago Four Flaggs was not open for lunch, but on an experimental basis lunch is now served, consisting of tuna fish à la raw, peanut butter soufflé, and breast of bologna with rice sauce. Entertainment begins nicely at 5 p.m. when old films of Star Trek are shown. During football season, beer is served every Sunday afternoon (free with dinner).





ARA



Cardinal Dining Hall, X5296, University Dining Hall, X5285
Open 7-10 a.m. for Breakfast, 11:30-1:30 for Lunch and 5-7 p.m. for Dinner. Individual yearly membership and proof thereof required. No reservations — you have to stand in line like everyone else — and stand — and stand — and stand. Prices range from \$1.25 for Breakfast to \$2.50 for a steak dinner.

Both of these places share the same corporate root — and they were just reroofed again — and have about the same menus, except that University

serves all boarders for lunch as Cardinal offers an à la carte service to non-boarders and university personnel and remains open on the weekends. I have eaten several times at both locations, and I am sorry to say under three different managements — no cause for joy there.

However, I feel compelled to note here that one is now able to enjoy unlimited seconds on most dishes at every meal. For those of us who were used to a one meat/four desserts intake ratio or sneaking through line twice, it came as a welcome amendment. (CU stock in MacDonald's immediately fell three points.) Extended breakfast hours also allow for the various life styles of the CU jet set.

Polyester steak and soybean hamburger were the exception and the rule, respectively, in terms of the meat department. A Shrine-load of spice was used this year, enough gravy to float a pocket battleship was spooned up, and the grease-fried covering of the salisbury steak out-volumed the raw meat inside three to one. Milk and sodas were in ample supply except on weekends at Cardinal. Before we "bring up" Cardinal, let me say that the breakfasts at University were usually excellent and could bring back the spark of life to any all-nighters.

As we go to press, my understanding is that weekend food service will shift to University — a commendable move. University is the much better equipped cafeteria — both in terms of serving and seating arrangements. The saying "as long as a Cardinal line" was quite apropos, for the Cardinal serving line seemed to operate on the principle that if there's anything you could possibly run out of, you will.

Specialty nights are observed once a month and offer cuisine from around the world, albeit Americanized. The staff dresses the part, new tablecloths are rolled out, and the lights are dimmed — a suspicious deed. The cheese and desserts served at some of these occasions were superb.

The personnel at ARA are, for the most part, unperturbed by food-line pressures, which can become somewhat hairy. Many of the staff are willing to go out of their way to help the students. As students hold down many jobs with the company, there are firm relations across the counter.

For the next year, a variety of meal programs will be offered. The prices, of course, try to drive the boarder towards the full twenty-one meal fare. To make up for the expected exodus of students from the full-week program, the school has required sophomores to board. Shades of government subsidizing of the Penn Central. Possibly in the future board will be able to hold onto students, and the mandatory board rule will not be required — until then jello will continue to bounce.



Shrine Cafeteria



South End of Basement, National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception 526-8300. Open 7:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Average lunch for two \$3.75; average dinner \$4.50. Reservations available through your local Pilgrimage Bus Line.

With the change in decor, the Shrine Cafeteria has lost its maidenhood; from a sterile hospital bleakness the premises have been converted with some black screen mesh, deep red booths, a picture gallery and a plush red carpet. Wala . . . your average K Street steak and cocktail house (sans cocktail, but assuredly more clothing to the waitress). A sign of the changing times — and the rising prices . . . for the same food. There is still something metric about the way the cooks dish out your helping of food — the famed Lenten helping. And the checkers are still able to add up your order faster than you can bless yourself.


However, the coffee is still out for the multi-cupper as it almost always is. One can still pick up a decent meal for a not unreasonable price. For those on the religious side, there's always time for a rosary or two while waiting in line. No one will look askance if you should bow your head to

ask the Lord's forgiveness and that He forego His vengeance — at least for this meal.

When the university food services close shop for vacation, the Shrine often becomes the only alternative for the dorm-bound pedestrians. But then again you rarely see more CU folk there at any other time; even when school's going full stream, you'll only find a few singles sitting in their booths behind the morning newspaper, surfacing to sip a little mocha-java and silence a smoldering butt. This is the Shrine atmosphere: in between classes and masses.

To those who like caffeine more than eggs, the Shrine Cafeteria is your spot. Weekdays are not as crowded as the weekends and a holyday — as lately experienced by this writer — can be disastrous if you're in a hurry. Tour busses seem to unload the cart for a Cecil B. DeMille 'Bible' movie; pity the late sleeper who arrives after the busses have.

Lunch and dinner are somewhat more expensive though quite competitive with a bland dining hall meal, but then again, at the Shrine they do not allow you to multiply your loaves and fishes as they do at ARA. To those with money, the Shrine menu offers enough variety and satisfaction; to those counting their pennies, the deal becomes less desirable. Still, all in all, it reflects the best in institutionalized on-campus cuisine. Definitely a place to hold your last supper.



6301 New Hampshire Ave., 270-9869; 4950 South Dakota Ave., 832-9754; 1229 New York Ave., 783-9757. Open daily from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. Reservations are not necessary; only cash and revolving doors accepted.

Just a few short years ago McDonald's was a small three-stool hamburger joint. Since that time it has expanded to become a multi-million dollar chain, found coast to coast. But you need not go that far, the three McDonald's operations listed above are easily accessible to any and all CU students whose stomachs act up at different times and who have a different knowledge of the city's layout. A missed meal or an empty stomach usually means a McDonald's run.

Two types of McDonald's runs are known to the average student. The first involves begging, borrowing, or stealing a car, spending some time in line while the servers fill (or fry) your order, and having



the patience not to accost the french fries before the divy-up back at the dorm. The second type involves a full (two-Mac, large fry-apple pie, cheeseburger and shake) stomach that's run out of time, some fast footwork, an empty stall, and plenty of white stuff. As they say: one good run leads to another.

But behind that bullet-proof plexiglass lurks the essence of bodily survival to many a college boarder. Big Macs seem to find universal acceptance among the big appetites, though Quarter-pounders do fill the gap quite nicely. Cold fries are an absolute necessity — hot fries are optional, depending on how fast your driver really is. And there appears to be a new shake for every holiday and state occasion.

But McDonald's is more than just carbohydrates. McDonald's is the Mom, apple pie, and American Flag of the carryouts. A chain that you will find everywhere, it's almost a bit of home wherever you find it. And no matter how long you have to wait in line — even til no one else is left to be served — still enough time is left to sneak back in line at Cardinal before anyone is the wiser.





"The alumni want to mix with the current students." With these words, Vincent Walter, director of alumni relations, indicated that the 1973 Homecoming, to be held October 19-21, will include activities of interest to both students and alumni.

Innovations in Homecoming activities include queen candidates from organized groups other than fraternities, a pre-game parade, and a country fair. Seven queen candidates will be presented at an open reception Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Social Center. Voting will take place Thursday in the Social Center, and the winner will be announced that evening at 10 p.m. on the steps of McMahon.

The parade will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday preceding the football game against St. Francis. About 14 queen candidates and organizations will participate in the parade.

Walter emphasized that the country fair Sunday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the gym "is open to the entire University family" and will include over 40 exhibitors of antiques, art, and other areas of interest. Admission to this event is free.

More traditional events include class reunions, Homecoming dance, and the awards banquet. The classes of '23, '33, '48, '58, and '63 will each have separate reunions on campus Friday night. Walter emphasized that these reunions are important to the alumni because the alumni are "sure their friends will be there."


The Homecoming dance will be held Friday from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. in the ballroom of the L'Enfant Plaza Hotel. Music will be continuously provided by the Fred Perry orchestra and the "Prophets." The Queen will be crowned at 10 p.m. Student tickets are available for \$3 in the Social Center.

The Cardinal Gibbons Medal, the university's top alumni award, will be presented to actress Helen Hayes at the Awards Banquet Saturday night at the L'Enfant Plaza Hotel. The Board of Governors of the Alumni Association chose Hayes "for her outstanding service to the country, Church, and the University," according to Walter.

Student coordinators for the Homecoming, Steve Schwartz and Ann Harkins, are planning a Cabaret, Saturday from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. in Caldwell.

The 1973 football season saw club football at Catholic gain more respectability as it compiled a 4-5 record. Under the direction of Head Coach Joe Pascale, little doubt remains that football at CU is here to stay. On a squad listing three All-Americans, Mike Cady, Gus Ibranyi, and Danny Newman, the Cards defeated Allegheny, 9-8; Scranton, 40-0; St. Vincent's, 27-8, and Gallaudet, 13-0. On the other hand, the losses were not truly reflective of the team's talent as American defeated the Cardinals, 9-8, in their opener, and St. Francis won 9-6. With just the right breaks, the season could have been reversed.

Catholic opened its season with a squeaker by defeating Allegheny.







The women's varsity basketball team ended its season with an 8-5 overall record, including tournament play. The team, consisting of twelve players, four of whom were seniors and promise good prospects for next year, started practice in November and continued a schedule of practice three times a week until its first season game on January 24 against Georgetown. Amid the cracking of breaking bats and the groaning of out-of-condition ball players, Catholic's baseball team began its '73 fall season.


With the only loss to the team roster being All-Metro Mark Dean, the acquisition of nine freshmen gave Coach Talbot's nine the most depth of any Catholic team in years, but the inexperience of the new players caused the Cardinals to lose several games on costly mistakes. The Cards fell, in order, to close rivals Mt. St. Mary's, 3-2, Howard, 9-6, and American, 1-0. Two more losses, American, 4-1, 1-0, in a double-header nudged Catholic's fall into third place behind George Mason and Howard University.

Catholic then caught fire in the final week of the baseball season, won four of its last six games, and finished in a tie for second place in the Metro-baseball League with a 11-9 record.

With the coming of spring, Catholic turned its diamond nine loose, winning the first four games of the season. The Red machine's guns boomed as C.U. sank George Washington, 5-4, Springfield, 10-9, Gallaudet, 8-2, and Eckherd, 7-6. The Cardinals also fared well in Florida as they split the two regular season games played there. In the sun the high-and-dry Cardinals edged crosstown rival George Washington, 5-4, and swamped American, 12-2.

Returning home, the Cards saw their fortunes rise and fall with the regularity of the tide, but the major reason for the Cards' success can be traced to M.V.P. recipient Andy Kurkjian, pitchers Steve Fay and Chuck Boettner and shortstop Jerry Laniak. Although Coach Talbot's Cardinals slowed their pace somewhat, they still were successful in capturing second place behind George Mason in the Mason-Dixon Conference.



'EVERYTHING YOU ALWAYS WANTED

INTERVIEW: A member of the Shahan Debate Society.

CARDINAL: Why did you first debate?

DEBATER: Like all my friends, I wanted to be accepted. I wanted to be one of the gang. So, against my better judgment, I had my first debate in Junior High.

CARDINAL: Did you win?

DEBATER: Well, actually I was so tense it took a number of times until I was self-confident enough to think on my feet and pull off the first big one.

CARDINAL: Is your first debate always the worst?

DEBATER: This is an old wives' tale that should go right out the window along with the myth that "All Debate Coaches are Created Equal." With careful planning and practice, your first debate can be just as enjoyable and fulfilling as any other debate in your life. However, it is true that if your partner (or in some rather conservative circles, your 'colleague') is experienced and kindhearted, this will make the whole affair a bit less tedious.

CARDINAL: Let's talk about this year's squad. How many members are on the roster?

DEBATER: Between eight and ten — if you count the coach, eleven and a half.

CARDINAL: What's the average experience of a member?

DEBATER: It varies. Immature members are usually of two years' experience while fully mature members have usually put in up to six or seven years. Of course, we are speaking in terms of light years.

CARDINAL: Is a lot of work required to be on the team?

DEBATER: I'd say it's a pretty heavy load to handle if you're carrying a full schedule, more so if you're overelecting. Most people find that the busier they are — the more work required of them — the more organized they become, and ultimately the more work they're capable of.

CARDINAL: How many meets, whatever, — they're called tournaments? thank you — do you attend, say, in a semester?

DEBATER: About six or seven; if you attend much more than that you get into trouble with the "National Committee" (of Debate Coaches) and they will "blackball" you from the N.D.T. (National Debate Tournament), which is similar to the N.C.A.A. Championship Playoffs.

CARDINAL: Could you explain . . .

DEBATER: The reasoning behind prohibiting teams from participating in more than six/seven events per semester is to prevent, first of all, schools from developing professional debators, and, secondly, to at least make an attempt to equalize the schools that have large and small budgets.

CARDINAL: What type of tournaments do we attend; what type of competition, school-wise, are we in contention with?

DEBATER: The cream of the crop: Northwestern, Harvard, Southern Cal, U.C.L.A., William and Mary, Rutgers. If you're talking about the number of schools in a given tournament, the number falls anywhere between sixty and one hundred and

twenty; on the other hand, teams, and schools can bring more than one team, sometimes as many as four, roughly 120. It depends on what the tournament allows you to bring. An average ratio is about 1.4/1.5 teams per school.

CARDINAL: Where have these tournaments been held?

DEBATER: Everywhere. We've been to Colorado, Missouri, Illinois, Massachusetts, Georgia, Florida. Next year we plan to travel out to California. There's a thing called the California Swing, in which U.S.C., U.C.L.A. and Redlands University all hold tournaments successively, which makes it definitely economical to go, considering the top talent that's there. In April, they'll hold the 1975 N.D.T. at the, I believe, University of the Pacific.

CARDINAL: Well, with only two men per team, how many people will you be taking on these trips?

DEBATER: We usually send two teams — four people and the coach.

CARDINAL: How often does the rest of the squad, the four or six, get to travel?

DEBATER: Two are administrators — as it's usually the case: the President and Vice-President — and have no desire to travel. The third and fourth teams travel a local circuit.

CARDINAL: Could you enlarge upon the role of your administrators?

DEBATER: Well, basically, we're a club, the Shahan Debate Society — you've heard of us, I suppose — funded by U.S.G., operated by students, etc. Our what-you-call-administrators, we-call-them-Tom-and-Bob, are actually a combination public relations, typists receptionists, bartenders, plumbers, etc.

CARDINAL: How do you determine the pecking order?

DEBATER: At the beginning of the year, it's up to the coach's discretion. As the year progresses, teams will establish their ability on competition.

CARDINAL: Does the second team ever beat the first team at a tournament? Or for that matter do the third and fourth teams ever beat the second?

DEBATER: Why don't you rephrase that question to 'Does the second team ever outperform the first team at a tournament?'

CARDINAL: O.K. Does the second team ever outperform the first team at a tournament?

DEBATER: No . . . but's that's not the truth. Actually it happens all the time. Of course, it depends on how closely matched the teams are and the breaks they may or may not get at the tournament?

CARDINAL: What do you think makes the biggest difference between a mediocre team and a first-rate team?

DEBATER: How high their forehead is? I'd say that there are two elements: research and the manner of presentation: your speaking, style, diction, organization . . . the overall permeability of your personality.

CARDINAL: You usually see debaters carrying huge files to their debates. Does the size of one's evidence make any difference?

TO KNOW ABOUT DEBATE*

DEBATER: Again an old wives' tale suggests that the larger the evidence file, the more effective the debate. Again, this is simply not true. It is how one handles one's own files that dictates their potency, not mere size. It is interesting to note that this thrill over size is a relatively new fascination; until recently, very few people would be seen at debates burdened with large files. But with the new plastic and light-weight files available, their popularity has spread.

CARDINAL: What part does the coach play?

DEBATER: That's a good question. Just the other day I asked our coach, "What part do you play?"

CARDINAL: How about a better answer?

DEBATER: How about a better question?

CARDINAL: How does the coach contribute to the team's success?

DEBATER: He plays the Devil's Advocate. He organizes, recruits, 'prootreads'; let's just say he puts it all together.

CARDINAL: Do coaches still debate?

DEBATER: No, but a lot of them like to watch. I suppose it would be somewhat disheartening to one's partner if one has to take a spoon of Geritol before a debate. Some of the older coaches have trouble getting psyched up for judging, let alone debating.

CARDINAL: Did you ever debate by yourself?

DEBATER: Yes, but this often raises difficult moral and social questions. Yet no matter what you hear, the truth is that almost every debater at one time or another attempts to go it alone. To many, this is the highest level of achievement. There is no scientific proof, by the way, to support the old claim that debating by yourself leads to mental disorders.

CARDINAL: Can one debate in large groups?

DEBATER: Recently there seems to be a move to debate with as many people as possible and to

hold as large a tournament as possible in very small quarters. But many debaters have complained that they feel like merely machines — being used and gaining no real identity. As a matter of fact, several debates of this sort have been raided out on the West Coast. My advice is to decide what debating really means to you, and then I would decide if the interpersonal relations actualized in such an assemblage — if as harmonious and congenial as suggested — would indeed be appropriate, commensurate, and consistent with prevailing religious and societal values... and then I'd pop some popcorn and watch TV. Uh, when is this going to end?

CARDINAL: Very soon. Just two more questions. Are you in favor of 3-man debate teams?

DEBATER: Let me begin by chastizing you for saying 3-MAN teams. That is an obvious male-chauvinist-piglet tendency we all must cast off. It should be 3-person teams. This, of course, involves what we used to call the mailman-now-a-mailperson-but that's another matter. Now, what was the question? Oh, No, I am against the 3-man, er person, team. If God had wanted us to debate in triplicate, well, Georgetown would have heard of it. Besides, it is obvious when one considers the personality conflicts inherent with just two people that to try three would be asking for havoc. Debate budgets would have to be slashed, inflation would exceed 7%, the price of rice in Hong Kong would get up to 7,000,000,000 pyongs per pwik. Besides, that third person might outspew me.





SPACE
